Lottie Moon

Missionary and WMU pioneer

Every Christmas season, WMU® promotes a denomination-wide offering for those serving with the International Mission Board, using 100 percent of the funds collected for missionary support. This offering has impacted thousands of missionaries and is significant because it is named for Lottie Moon, a remarkable missionary and WMU pioneer.

Coming to Christ

Charlotte "Lottie" Moon was born into a wealthy Southern family in 1840. Though her mother was a devout Baptist, Lottie was not converted until adulthood. For many years, she was a skeptic, due in part to her older sister Orianna's influence. Orianna was one of the first women to graduate from medical school in America; she was incredibly intelligent, politically progressive, and intensely cynical of religion.

While on a trip to the Holy Land in the spring of 1858, Orianna's eyes were opened to the gospel, and she returned home a believer in Jesus. God used Orianna to speak into Lottie's life, and by winter of that year, Lottie also came to know Jesus.¹

Lottie was highly intelligent and one of the first American women to earn her master of arts degree. While in school, the desire to serve overseas began to grow in Lottie's heart. She was ready to go immediately, but the Lord had her wait. She worked as a teacher and a nurse during the Civil War, trusting God with her desire to go overseas. Finally, on September 1, 1873, she boarded a boat and set sail for China.²

Serving on the Field

Lottie was accompanied by another one of her sisters, Edmonia, and other women and men who shared the call to missions. Upon their arrival in China, they quickly realized there were great challenges to the missionary life, including political unrest, severe loneliness, debilitating famine, and funding needs.³ Edmonia eventually returned home, unable to take the pressure and hardships of life on the field.⁴ Lottie faithfully continued in her call. She taught in schools, traveled to many villages, planted churches, cared for children, and advocated for woman-to-woman discipleship.

While on the field, Lottie communicated frequently with Southern Baptist women. She was vocal about the difficulties of the missions field and challenged

Exciting things are happening at Dodson Elementary! We started our 2019-20 **Good News Club (GNC)** on Thursday, September 5. Each Thursday afternoon we meet with 18 children to share Bible stories and the gospel of Jesus Christ. We just completed our study of Peter and have begun our next six-week study of Joseph. Each week the children have a snack, share whether they completed their Jesus and Me (JAM) sheets for each day, hear a story, learn a memory verse, and have great fun and competition in a review game. While several of the children regularly attend church, approximately half do not attend church anywhere. We are excited to share Jesus with the children as well as with their parents during pick-up time, as we have opportunity. We are definitely on the front lines of sharing the gospel in the public school setting and are grateful for the opportunity. Please be praying for continued open doors for GNC.

Our **Father's Heart** ministry remains active this year. So far this school year we have assisted one GNC family with a crisis need and have purchased coats for children who need one. We coordinated with two Sunday School classes who also donated new or gently used coats. We love to provide warm coats for these children who have none to wear during the cold winter months.

There is always a need for classroom volunteers. We are also looking for ways to bless the teachers in various ways. Nancy Andrews currently enjoys serving as a classroom reader with **Book 'Em Reading is Fundamental** where she reads to a classroom five times during the school year and allows each child to pick out a book for their very own at each reading event. The children are always very excited to hear the stories and to pick out their books. Many children do not have books at home, and this is a very easy way to encourage reading and literacy.

The Pregnancy Care Center appreciates the faithful support and partnership in ministry of TGBC! There are so many ways you are a blessing to us from monthly car seat donations, to the one-on-one investment in our client(s) lives, to bottles full of change, prayers lifted up, volunteer hours, faithful giving, and so much more!

The Center is once again in a period of rapid growth. God is growing our influence and expanding our territory. As of 10/31/19 we have facilitated over **1,000 client visits** (a 37% increase YTD from last year), with 248 of those visits being first time meetings with people needing our services (a 67% YTD increase in NEW clients)! Our volunteers and staff have provided **over 200 pregnancy test/decision consultations** and **over 665 parenting lessons**. This year we have added **on-campus services at Hillsboro High School** and have begun leading a **healthy relationships club in one of our local middle schools**. People are experiencing the love of Christ and learning about hope in Him on a daily basis!

Women on Mission Sisters

WoM Sisters provided another cooking group at **Rest Stop Ministries** in October to make shepherd's pie, Asian salad, cornbread, mixed berries, peanut butter cookies, and homemade ice cream! We continue to be blessed by serving with this ministry. Upcoming cooking groups are scheduled Sunday Dec. 22 2-5pm, Saturday Feb. 22 3-6pm, and Saturday Apr. 25 3-6pm.

Our September meeting focused on **Tennessee Disaster Relief (TNDR)**. Our group collected gift cards for TNDR. We also took 25 empty backpacks provided by our daytime WoM group to fill for **TBMB's Christmas Backpack** project and returned the filled backpacks in October. They were delivered to the TNDR Missions Mobilization Center in Mt. Juliet to be distributed to children in poverty in Tennessee. TGBC WoM, GA, RA, and Mission Friends families provided a total of 35 filled backpacks for this mission project. TBMB collected 4,915 backpacks during the three-day collection period toward their goal of 5,000!

At our October meeting we learned about **Operation Amalia in Guatemala** and took a collection that will provide much needed infant vitamins for the 15 babies living in the dump in Jalapa Guatemala for almost 8 months.

In November our meeting was at the **Baptist Global Response** office. We learned about their global disaster relief and community development work in partnership with the SBC and IMB. We packed 12 BGR Disaster Relief Kits at the meeting and took a collection to provide 12 additional kits.

WoM Sisters will not meet in December. Everyone is encouraged to support BGR by providing farm animals in the **BGR Gift Catalogs** located throughout the church and online at gobgr.org/gift-catalog.

The January 7 WoM Sisters meeting will be at the home of Brenda Sutherland with speaker Dr. April Jones. She is the author of <u>No Mess, No Message: Finding Strength in Struggle and</u> <u>Purpose in Pain</u> about "a young mother who battled her two-year-old son's cancer while getting her doctorate. Her struggle to make the heart wrenching decisions with her family led to a discovery of God, courage, and a happiness within that helped her transform scary misfortune into a joy-filled life." Her son Tyler is a good friend of Andrew Mathis and is now 18 years old.

In February, WoM Sisters will meet at **Begin Anew's Madison campus** Monday, Feb. 3, at 6pm to provide a **Valentine Party for the children** of the men and women taking classes to improve their skills and find better jobs. Begin Anew's mission is to empower individuals in Middle Tennessee to overcome obstacles caused by poverty by providing education, mentoring, and resources. Girls in Action and Royal Ambassadors

In August our GAs studied about the refugees that are pouring into **Greece** from the Middle East. We studied about the missionaries and helpers at the Refugee Center. We had an awesome video about how God is working among the refugees through Christians, dreams, and events to bring them the Good News! We were able to Skype with Lauren Brewer, a young lady from Mt. Juliet who was a GA and now is a medical student at UT Memphis. She just returned in August from the Refugee Center in Greece! GAs got to hear her tell about her experiences and what she did first hand. The girls were able to ask her lots of questions afterwards.

In September the GAs had fun learning about missionaries in the "Land Down Under— **Australia.**" We also studied about the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions and learned how we could help by giving money to help fund programs in Tennessee for refugees, new church startups and revitalization, summer camps, and programs like the **TBMB Christmas Backpack** donation, in which our church participated to help impoverished families in Tennessee, many of which do not even have running water. Also in September, the GAs and RAs were invited to a **cookout at the WMU missionary house**, known as "Mary's House," that Tennessee WMU built on John Hager Road near the Missions Mobilization Center (MMC). The GALE family, missionaries from Africa, are currently living in the house during their six-month stateside assignment and hosted the RA and GA families for hotdogs, sides, and s'mores. The kids were able to do activities, see pictures, and hear stories about life in Africa and reaching people for Christ in a mostly Muslim area.

In October we studied about Associational Missions in **Kentucky**. We learned about how an association of churches within an area can cooperate to help each other. We also had an Emphasis on **World Hunger** and on **Baptist Global Hunger Relief**, an agency that works with BGR to help with hunger relief on a global scale. We made cards for **Love on the Homeless** and for our church staff this month. We were also busy with our **TBMB Christmas Backpack** collection. Our RAs and GAs placed Bibles and the Christmas Story into the filled backpacks that our WoM Sisters, GA, RA, and Mission Friends families filled and returned and labeled them with colored ribbons for gender and age based on the contents. We then took them to the gym to store them to be delivered to the MMC collection site where they will be distributed to children in poverty in Tennessee.

In November we studied **Send Relief** and learned about adoption and foster care. We learned about the Ross family who are helping with planting churches in **New Orleans** and who have fostered and adopted two children along with their other four children. We will also be studying about international missions and the upcoming **Lottie Moon Christmas Offering** that will help our Southern Baptist missionaries and churches all over the world. We will then be working with adults as we put together bicycles/tricycles for donation to the **Nashville Baptist Association's Toy Store**.

In December we have a very short month but will manage to squeeze in making fruit baskets for our own **homebound members** and having a **Christmas party** for the GAs and RAs.

In January we will learn about "One More Child." In February our unit is about Cambodia, and we will be looking ahead to celebrating Valentine's Day and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions.

those in the States to provide better support for missionaries. Her determined and insistent push for improvement was a pivotal factor in WMU's formation. Lottie also inspired WMU to take up an offering to support international missionaries. This began when Lottie refused to take her much overdue furlough until missionaries were in place to continue her work. She pleaded with WMU to raise the money to send two people to take over in her absence. WMU delivered, raising enough money to send three people to relieve her.₅ The 1888 fund-raiser was such a success that WMU continued to take it up every year, eventually developing into the Christmas offering we collect today.

Lottie served on the field faithfully, sacrificing her home, energy, and even her food for the sake of others. She gave her life for China, ministering there for almost 40 years until her death in 1912.⁶ Five years after Lottie died, WMU's fundraiser for international missions was named after her.⁷

Advancing His Kingdom

As you prepare to give to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering[®], reflect on the ways God used Lottie and ask Him how He wants to use you. The same God who used this tiny woman (she stood only 4 foot, 3 inches) in the 1800s to advance His kingdom is ready to use you too.

Baptist Global Response

Baptist Global Response (BGR) is a disaster relief and community development organization with a heart for helping people in desperate need. BGR seeks to demonstrate the love of God so that people in need have the opportunity to experience the full and meaningful lives God created them to enjoy. Their desire is to see people live their lives with hope and peace, inspired to raise their families in confidence, build their communities with dignity and share this life with others.

BGR undergirds the work of Southern Baptists worldwide and responds to people with critical needs, whether those needs arise from chronic conditions—like extreme poverty, contaminated water, or endemic hunger—or acute crises—such as natural disaster, personal trauma, or social upheaval.

Our church is encouraged to support BGR by providing gifts in the BGR Gift Catalog this Christmas. Several catalogs are available through the church, and it is also available online at gobgr.org/gift-catalog. Gifts include farm animals such as chickens, pigs, lambs, fish, rabbits, and cows that allow our IMB missionaries to minister to the people they serve using agriculture to educate them to be self-supporting. BGR also uses your gifts to help dig wells to provide clean water and disaster relief kits to disaster areas such as those affected by Hurricane Dorian.
